Questions sent in advance -

The TFG meeting have raised 6 questions that they would like answered and thought you would like to see these in advance.

1. Why did MDDC agree to change from a proposed provision of 5 affordable homes to an actual provision of 4

2. Why was neither the Parish Council nor neighbouring residents consulted about the s106 variation in December 2021 that changed the types of affordable homes?

3. The 'Shared Equity product' - 20% off mkt value – that now remains seems odd, and much less affordable to modest-income households than conventional shared ownership. Why has the allocation of this home been delegated to the developer, and is the allocation of this policed by MDDC or is the developer left to select the buyer?

4. The self-build affordable home seems highly unusual. Is there evidence that this has been marketed at all? The fixed price of £100k seems very low compared to market value and the buyer is permitted (under the s106) to flip it within 18 months by paying only £25k more. This seems to be a way to give someone £100k in 2 years. Again, why does the developer allocate this and does MDDC police the arrangement?

5. The TFG realise our challenges about the Broadlands site risk becoming a lost cause. However we hope that there are some lessons to be learnt for the future. And the Parish Council had 3 residents who are genuinely in need of affordable homes who came to a PC meeting to express their disappointment and explain the problems they had encountered with this development. Is there anything MDDC can offer to help these people?

In more general terms the Council would like to know more about the rationale and process of s106 variations and how affordable home allocation is monitored.

12.5 Jubilee Green & Barliabins (incl small trees in the Rec hedge)

Barliabins Section 106 Funds Working Group Report to Thorverton Parish Council 10 May 2022

1. The Barliabins s106 Working Group met on 20 April to review progress on actions proposed for using s106 funds that were first outlined at the TPC meeting of 14 December 2021. It was agreed then that the Working Group should explore the feasibility and costs of the works and make recommendations to the Council.

2. There is a common theme to the actions proposed that is consistent with national and local policy and activity. In the 2021 Environment Act there is a requirement to produce Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS). In Devon this work is led by Devon Local Nature Partnership, which has established a Parish and Town Council Wildlife Network as part of its "Wild About Devon" initiative. Parish and Town Councils have a statutory duty to conserve wildlife, and this new network aims to help guide and inspire community action for wildlife by linking communities with Devon Local Nature Partnership's partners, with the aim of making a real difference to Nature Recovery in their area, through tree planting, grass verge management and other methods.

At its most recent meeting the s106 Working Group agreed to recommend to the full Council that the proposals should now be implemented, with the first stage being consultation with local people. Specifically, the Working Group recommends that the Parish Council approves;

a) the use of s106 funds to make environmental improvements to key areas to improve public enjoyment and nature recovery in the village; and

b) contact with local residents to inform them of the approach and invite them to participate.

At this stage the Working Group is not recommending any expenditure, though it is likely approval for spending on tree work will be sought later in the summer.

4. In order to spend the s106 funds effectively the Working Group proposes to;

a) identify Environmental Improvement Areas for the initial focus of this work. These should be some of those which the Parish Council owns and/or manages, namely Barliabins, the Jubilee Green, Leigh Gardens and some roadside verges (to be identified);

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b) include the area known as "Dorothy's Triangle" on the list of Environmental Improvement Areas;

c) inform residents about the Parish Council's environmental improvement strategy and invite them to participate in specifying, implementing and monitoring the works; and

d) explore the details of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative to establish whether Barliabins might be a suitable site for inclusion; <u>https://queensgreencanopy.org</u>

5. The Working Group will take specific action to inform and consult residents on the suggestions for Barliabins. This includes sending a letter (delivered to each house and on social media) to all residents describing the purpose of the plans and including an Artist's Impression, and this should be done as soon as possible so that active participation and consultation can take place during the summer. This timing would also enable Barliabins to be an area for tree planting under the Queens Green Canopy initiative, which encourages communities and individuals to "Plant a tree for the Jubilee" between October 2022 and March 2023.

6. A representative from Devon Wildlife Trust has offered to visit Thorverton to advise the Parish Council on what action to take to increase biodiversity in the area. She has also sent information from Devon County Council about how to manage the roadside verges to benefit wildlife, while ensuring contractors and volunteers remain safe. The Working Group intends to contact these experts as they will give us detailed and practical advice which will assist us in preparing a Management Plan for the Environmental Improvement Areas.

7. Dorothy's Triangle is a key area for environmental improvement but is not owned or managed by the Council. The Land Registry shows that it is unregistered, so that whoever owns it may not be aware that they do, or they may have passed away or moved. The Working Group recommends that Dorothy's Triangle should be included on the list of Environmental Improvement Areas, but that any work should stop immediately if the owner requests it. If, after twelve years, the owner has not made themselves known the Parish Council can apply to register it.

8. Working Group Members have, and will attend webinars that are available to help Parish Councils gain more detailed information on improving biodiversity, and on involving local people in such work.

Agenda Item 13 Raddon Hills Group Report

Circulated by Cllr Lane on 27th April

Yesterday evening I attended the quarterly meeting of the Raddon Hills Group of parish councils. There were representatives from Huxham, Newton St Cyres, Sandford, Silverton, Stoke Canon and Upton Pyne Parish Councils as well as Margaret Squires, Bob Deed and Ros Davies who is DCC's Footpaths Officer.

I mentioned to Ros Davies that the track from St Martin's Chapel down to Lee Cross, while apparently open when approached from the top, still had a "No Public Right of Way" sign at the bottom end. Ros said that she would investigate.

Ros reported that the bridge across the River Exe at Burn Halt (near to Traymill) had yet to be assessed by an engineer. I think that we are already resigned to this being far too low down the DCC Highways priority list to be likely to be repaired/rebuilt, although Margaret Squires does have a strong personal interest in having it operative.

Newton St Cyres had recently held a public meeting on climate change which threw up several suggestions as to positive actions that parishes might do. They said that they would share the results with this Group.

I told the Group that we were just about to carry out an electric vehicle charging point survey, which I would share with the Group. No parish reported on installing any EV points yet.

We had a presentation from Dave Horton (Upton Pyne) about changes in agriculture. This was mostly lost on me though as my screen froze, however, judging from the discussion when I was able to get back into the meeting, I didn't miss much that would be of interest to us as a parish council.

I mentioned that we had an issue with MDDC having agreed an amendment to the s106 agreement adversely affecting the availability of affordable housing on our new development. Bob Deed said that the protocol for any changes should at the very least involve the ward councillor being informed, so he was disappointed that this had not happened. However, he gave no hope that the decision might be reversed.

The next meeting will be at 7.30pm on Wednesday 27th July in Thorverton (I have sought to book the Hall). The main focus of the meeting will be on the availability of grants from different sources for different things. Bob said that he would ask an MDDC expert to come along and Margaret said that she would also see if she could field a DCC expert. Roger Cashmore also offered to give an update at that meeting on rural broadband.

Also I noticed the laminate of councilor names needs updating. This can probrably wait until a new councilor is co-opted. - Jim is this something you can do once we are at full capacity again please. Finally who is the next victim for April's Market?

Comment from Cllr Lane - I trust that we will have an item on the April agenda covering points raised at the Market. It might be worthwhile agreeing what key documents should be available on our table at each Market - presumably a list of councillors; our new leaflet; and the council's aims/objectives at the very least.

14.2 Green Work - from the Royal British Legion

The Thorverton branch of the Royal British Legion in April will have just completed our second year of our community project looking after the Jubilee green, just to recap on the past 12 months, for six months we cut the grass once a week and the other six months during winter we cut the grass when needed and weather permitting, we have added four more roses to the beds in addition to the eight we added in the first year and keep them well pruned.

Last Autumn we added 200 more daffodil bulbs to the three beds and around the main tree, the four stone troughs by the railings had new compost and were planted with summer bedding plants then in October replanted with winter pansies and spring tulips, we also keep the brook weed free and tidy and as you know we added a repro. Victorian lamp to the old original lamp stand.

The expenditure has been kindly sponsored by residents and our own community fund; all the work has obviously been done voluntary, if you would like us to do it for another year, we will be very pleased to carry on.

14.3 Email from a resident – 15th March

I don't know how many Councillors are aware, but there is a lot of litter strewn around the Quarry Car Park, which, as you will be aware, is owned by the Parish Council.

Quite a cache of old beer cans has appeared recently in the gaps between some of the garages, but a considerable amount of litter has been building up for some time, particularly around the perimeter and lodged in undergrowth here and there. This gives a very poor impression of the village, particularly to visitors who often park there.

If there is to be a village tidy-up or litter- picking day this year, could the car park be a priority please?

14.4 Sheep Dip Benches - email from Cllr Uglow

I have been asked by a parishioner, would it be possible that Thorverton Parish Council could take liaise with the church commissioners about the maintenance of the Sheep Dip benches and the general tidiness of the area the public were aloud. One of the benches is in need of repair.

Comment from Cllr Lane - I can't recall what we decided at our March meeting, but unless we decided that we would offer to pay for a new/repaired bench, I don't think that we should take this too far forward. By all means ask the Church Commissioners - as research! - but we must not forget that the area is not ours and were we to start paying for improvements to it, we might be inadvertently taking on some legal responsibility. Perhaps the way to approach it is to ask the CC if they would be good enough to improve the area which they are responsible for, for the benefit of the public.

Hello, I am making an enquiry to see if it would be possible to purchase a bench for the benefit of Thorverton Village in memory of a lovely couple who spent many happy years in the Exe valley. Jeanne was born in Thorverton and both died in their 90's. Would this be possible please?

National Salary Award 2021/2022

The National Joint Council for Local Government Services (NJC) has reached an agreement on the new rates of pay applicable from 1 April 2021. The new rates have a 1.75% increase applied, and employers are encouraged to implement this pay award as swiftly as possible.

Important note: Backpay for employees who have left since 1 April

If requested by an ex-employee to do so, we recommend that employers should pay monies due to that employee from 1 April 2021 to the employee's last day of employment.

When salary arrears are paid to ex-employees who were in the Local Government Pension Scheme (LPGS), the employer must inform its local LGPS fund. Employers will need to amend the CARE and final figures (if the ex-employee has pre-April 2014 LGPS
